

James Allen

15th July 1934—14th January 2022

An all round good fellow, nature's gentleman, a man of knowledge and a can do attitude, describes James. A family man through and through, with simple tastes and pleasures, he loved cooking, gardening and all things with wheels – planes, trains & automobiles. Stubborn, macho with a gentle side and always happy to help others with anything. He obtained a solo pilot's licence and was also interested in astronomy.

His early school years were spent in Warracknabeal at the local Convent being taught by the nuns. Their specialty was "the strap" used when students misbehaved. The story goes that one night, after he left the school, James broke into the school and cut the strap into small pieces.

He had an active childhood which he enjoyed immensely and laid the foundation for later activities. He was a Boy Scout and faithfully followed the "Be Prepared" motto. He was very proud of his bright green canoe which he shared with his friends. After year 11 at school, he gained an automotive apprenticeship in Warracknabeal which was later moved to Box Hill and he attended Richmond Tech. He rode a motor-bike, much to his Mum's horror, and traded it for a 1948 Anglia which he later rebuilt with the "James touch" and managed to obtain the original number plates for it.

In 1954 he met Colleen at a dance, escorted her home and spent two hours talking to her on the front porch. They married in 1958. As their family grew, they moved house until finally buying a block of land in Heathmont and building a house. Soon, their family grew to two sons and three daughters. James could turn his hand to anything including building a brick fence, which was to direct storm water but which his daughters thought was to keep the boyfriends out. If that was the case, it did not work. He enjoyed waking teenagers up on a Sunday morning by playing Frank Sinatra songs, loudly.

James ran a service station with a friend but that did not work out. Later he established and successfully ran a Mont Albert auto workshop - James Allan Tuning & Transmissions (JATT). Colleen, the absolute love of his life, died in 2019 and life was just not the same for James. A later, serious medical diagnosis did not help. We are sadder for James' passing but know that he is now at peace and we extend our condolences to Gregory, Louise, Julie, Grant & Andrea and their families.

An Extract from Mum's Diary of part of our trip around Australia with a 1939 Chev and a 16 foot Caravan. (1954 to 1956)

Our family consisted of Mum and Dad, my brother Allan and myself.. I was 15 and Allan was 13.

Also our dog ... "Spotty".

Top Springs to Inverway, Northern Territory. 320 kms.. (200 Miles)
Saturday 18th. August, 1956.

Intended getting away earlier this morning, so rose at daylight and were ready to pull out by 9am. Top Springs is a homestead with a tiny store attached and a bowser. We got petrol, oil and kerosene, also tinned butter and some biscuits. Several people were around there. 3 or 4 young stockmen from Berrimba, a couple of aboriginals and a dark girl. Also a middle-aged man, apparently from Berrimba. He was the one who passed us on the road the previous night, taking the injured man in. The man was in a bad way, suspected broken back from a fall off a horse. They had carried him over very rough country for 20 miles some forty miles out of Berrimba. Just then the plane was heard approaching.

The store was part of the house, and we were attended by, presumably, the lady of the house herself. Partitions between the rooms were only about 4 feet high. As we left, the other party in the Dodge went out to the aerodrome to pick up the Sister and pilot.

We found the road in fair condition, until about 16 miles out when we struck a 2 mile stretch of volcanic rock, over which we merely crawled, so slow that the speedo needle hung below zero. A clear space on top of a ridge, then another 2 miles of lava road. After that it was not too bad, having just been graded.

Creeks were dry. Crossings fairly abrupt, but we didn't touch. Hilly country, chocolaty soil, but very stony and rocky. Large areas of volcanic rock. Sun hot, a strong wind blowing. Met a mob of stock and pack horses in the charge of 3 or 4 coloured boys. Soon after, a large herd of cattle in the charge of about 5 coloured boys and 1 white man. The Stock Route apparently follows this road.

It was after dinner (lunch) when we met a large truck with a grader on the back. It was being taken to Katherine for repairs. Driver told us the bulldozer and grader were working on the road from Wave Hill to Inverway. We passed a large road trailer, deserted, apparently because of tyre trouble. "Donald's Transport". A picture of Donald Duck adorned the door.

Later in the afternoon we came in sight of the low row of hills from which, presumably, Wave Hill takes its name. The gates were opened by 2 dark children and we drove in and up to the bowser, but no-one seemed interested in us. A chap, who just arrived with a suitcase, told us the storeman had just knocked off for the day, so, not being really short of petrol, we left and took the road for Inverway.

It was rough and stony, anything but good. We had been warned we might get into trouble at Victoria River. Just outside Wave Hill Station was the C.W.D, camp, a caravan, small, and a couple of single tents. It was getting late as we came to a large creek. It could almost have been the river, but we were not far enough out of town. The bulldozer had been working there and really made a mess of the crossing. No running water, just a huge waterhole above the crossing.

Road in the bed of the creek was all loose sand, the climb out was not very steep, but terribly rough—stones and big rocks scattered everywhere. Halfway up the steepest part we stopped. Contemplated the dozer, but there



was no towing rope anyway. Tried the car again and pushed. Impossible to back the caravan because rocks slewed it all over the place. Tried it again with pushing and this time the axle broke. So there we stayed, in the middle of the road.

Put the pushbike together and Frank (Dad) went back to the C.W.D camp. He came back about 2 hours later in the truck with the truck and dozer drivers. They towed the car and caravan up the bank to the "shade" of the one tree on that bare and rocky slope. They wanted to take us right back to the Station. However the wheel was almost off the car by the time it stopped on the slope.

Sunday 19th. August.

Cold day, gale force winds.

Frank rode bike back to Wave Hill Station to try to get something done about the axle. Worked

in the station workshop. Blacksmith would not attempt to forge it. Oxy welding plant not suitable for the job. Lathe out of action. No electric welder. Frank put sleeve on axle and bolted it.

Here it was washing day. Took tub, boiler dishes, clothes, etc. over half a mile of rocks down to the waterhole and boiled and washed our clothes. Dried on line between trees. It was at all times a battle with the wind. Flocks of birds, mostly green parrots, at their evening frolics, sweeping like fantastic wraiths against the distant sky overhead then twisted and turned with a rush of wings and a flash of colour.

Frank home before dark. No dinner. Put axle in car while I washed our clothes. Ironed at night. Washed hair. Bed at 1am.

Monday 20th.

Packed up this morning, ready for the big test. We went 6 yards..... and it snapped. So we unpacked. Frank rode into Wave Hill and sent a telegram to Darwin, left another one to go to Perth if necessary. Station store man gave us meat and bread. Bull-dozer working on crossing. Grader went out 10 miles and came back, Said he will take us to Victoria River tomorrow if we want to go out. C.W.D. camp shifting tomorrow. Donald's transport went through. C.W.D. driver filled our caravan water tank.

Tuesday 21st.

Expecting grader this morning at 9.30am. We had breakfast and packed up, quite early. We had a few bad moments, just after 8 0'clock when we heard the grader coming. But it turned out that he was shifting their own trailer and caravan. While waiting for him to come we watched the display of thousands of green parrots. The sky was dark with them, as they spread out overhead or swept in undulating waves on the horizon.

Presently the grader arrived, graded a road into the car, then towed us at less than 5mph. We climbed gradually to the top of a grassy treeless hill, had a wonderful view of the countryside, then started to descend. Soon we were following a road that wound between mountains and crossed a wide sandy creek. There were a few rough rocky patches. Then we saw the C.W.D. camp at the side of the road, and immediately began the descent into the Vic-

toria River. There was a deep pool upstream, but the crossing was dry and consisted of flat stones. The climb up was very steep, and the soil was very loose and sandy. We were parked under a tree, almost a quarter mile from the bank. 5 miles from where we broke the axle.

Settled in, had dinner (*lunch*), then Frank visited the Policeman. Later on we walked on the river bank, Eddie and Allan looking at the possibility of fishing. Policeman came looking for us. Had word from Darwin that no axle was available. Also one could not get here from Perth till next week. Later Frank discussed other possibilities with policeman, but there seems to be no other alternative. After that we followed the creek down to the river to look for our fishermen, but they, failing to find any bait, had gone home. As we walked back we met the C.W.D. truck and 3drivers. They promised to fill our water-tank tomorrow.

Wednesday 22nd.

A new school for dark children is being built near the Police Station, also kitchen quarters and School-master's residence. The house is on tall



thin blocks, 4 inch cement pipes, I believe. Looks top heavy. Policeman's house is older style, high blocks, living area at ground level, floor of concrete slabs, cool breezeways, rooms completely enclosed by fly gauze. One or two solid walls, evidently to shut out cold winds. Top portion of house...instead of having solid walls, has a louvered type of wall from floor to ceiling.


C.W.D. truck arrived with water. We filled tank, water-bags, buckets, etc.. Promised Frank a lift into station in afternoon. We prepared to have breakfast after he left, but he was back almost immediately, said he was going to town then. So while he went off to attend to something, Frank had a hasty breakfast, took axle out of car, with Eddie and Allan helping, changed, and was ready to go with him. (to be continued...)



CHACA CLUB PERMIT SCHEME **ELIGIBILITY GUIDELINES**

CHACA is a VicRoads authorised Club to participate in the VicRoads Club Permit Scheme (CPS).

VicRoads has set rules to determine the eligibility of vehicles for the Club Permit Scheme. These may be viewed in the CPS handbook or on the VicRoads website. CHACA has set its own additional requirements for vehicles to be submitted for the CPS using CHACA's authorisation. The additional requirements are in line with the original CHACA charter of vehicle originality and preservation.

The following are CHACA's requirements for Members submitting vehicles for CPS assessment.

- 1. The vehicle must have been manufactured prior to 1st December 1992.
- 2. The member submitting the application must have been a CHACA member for at least 3 months.
- 3. Vehicles submitted for CPS application must be as the manufacturer originally designed and built. Some modifications are permitted in line with the original manufacture option list, are period correct, or are based on safety issues, but in all cases must not detract from originality. Replicas derived from a lower model are acceptable as long as the appearance is as original as possible to the intended vehicle model (e.g. GT Falcon from a base Falcon).
- 4. Applicants for the CPS will certify that the vehicle submitted will remain roadworthy during the permit period and unmodified from what was originally submitted.
- Once a vehicle has been accepted by CHACA for CPS it will be the members' responsibility to 5. maintain the vehicle as originally presented, with no further modifications and in a roadworthy condition for all permit renewal applications.
- Determination of the eligibility for any vehicle submitted to CHACA for CPS will be at the discre-6. tion of the Committee. Vehicle CPS application must be submitted to the Technical Officer in writing.







