

# Top Springs to Inverway, cont.

We moved 6 yards and the axle went. A big repair job, then we winched the car and caravan back to give it a good start, slightly downhill, and Frank drove up the slope, Spotty following as hard as he could run. The road was fairly good until we struck a few rough creek crossings. First one we kept up speed to save the axle and the caravan came down on the towbar, where both welds are already broken and the goose-neck is bending alarmingly. Next gully we slowed down to save the tow-bar and a few yards on, the axle broke and the wheel began to come off. So we had dinner there. Wheel fixed, we inspected road ahead. Three gutters, any one of which might cause us to come to grief. So we pushed, Spotty ran, and we were safely across. Then another gully, and we walked again. After that the road improved considerably, but we only went about 2miles before the axle went again. Stop and go through the whole procedure again.

Just after dinner we had spoken to a couple in a Holden who were going to Wave Hill. Their name was Lee, of Alice Springs. They told us Limbunya turn-off was about 5 miles ahead, and a truck from there was at Inverway. So while Eddie and Allan finished doing the axle, Frank rode the bike to the turn-off and found the road was good, and the truck apparently still at Inverway. So we drove on to there, Eddie followed on the bike. Still no tyre tracks. Cold wind blowing. Bake damper. Keep watch for lights.

# Sunday 26th.

Breakfast, partly pack for travelling. Truck did not return to Limbunya during the night. Cold morning, so we lay on the grass in the warm sunshine. Eddie went along the road on the bike to see how bad or good it was. Presently a Holden came along. Couple from Melbourne, sympathized with us, told us we were in a bad way, no hope of getting through with a caravan. We should turn round and head back for the bitumen as fast as we could.

Then along came a couple in a utility, name on the side, "Northern Agency Ltd., Darwin" He told us, among other things, of a truck coming behind him, partly loaded, which could tow us into Inverway. So we finished packing and the truck arrived very soon. It also belonged to Northern Agency, and was driven by a fairly "New Australian". Not over

friendly, not over anxious to take us in tow. However we started off and he stepped on it as if trying to get away from us and we raced along, careering between the trees with, I fear, very little to spare. The breaking of the rope ended that nightmare. Frank asked him to take it steady. After that we caught up with his boss, having dinner, and his approval of us seemed to improve his disposition., slightly. After that we went along fairly steadily, except for a tendency to jerk on the tow-rope at bad crossings.

It broke several times, mostly on hills, once in a little sharp gully where the back bumper of the car sat on the ground and the front of the caravan touched the ground.. Still he worried, always saying there was worse ahead. A couple of times he stalled on steep hills. Most hills were not long, although steep. At last we were in the much talked-about Swan River.. Everyone talked about this river and said we would have plenty of trouble there. A winding creek, crossed 5 times in as many miles, but the road runs in the valley of it, and piled up rubbish indicates a depth of up to 10 feet of water over the entire area in the wet season. The mountains on either side form the banks, and in places thrust forward imposingly, bare and rugged, and then there's the place where the rocks form a tiled floor in the valley. The road in places has become another creek, in other places the washouts have cut perilously close to the wheel tracks. The caravan slid over one and we rode on the axle for a few feet. One place the makeshift road went straight up the hillside, then curved down again, all the way following the contour of the mountain-side. It felt the way a fly ought to feel climbing a wall.

Once out of the Swan, our friend's temper seemed to improve, and things went fairly smoothly, but very dusty, until we saw Inverway, set in the midst of a rather open plain. Our friend, Gus Ringlo, parked us and left. Frank saw Mrs. Underwood, then, on her advice, moved nearer a "guesthouse and shower...

#### Monday 27th.

Slept late. Cold morning, but had cold showers. Breakfast, then visited Mr. and Mrs. Underwood, got some food supplies from the store room, tried to contact Katherine by rasign was 'SZ". She could not get through., so we went "home" and were about to have dinner when a shy dusky lass came over and told us, "Missus wanted us to go to the house, as she was in the wireless". She had contacted Katherine.

Most of the day the natives seem to sit in the shade of a few trees. When the shade moves, they follow it. The older of the time. There are 3 tribes, each having their little community centre a short distance from the station buildings and each other. Crows and hawks circle endlessly all day long. In the afternoon a truck came in, Mr. and Mrs. Kells and family of about 5 boys, who had been bush fencing. They live in the shed here, so we moved further away. Another car... travellers passing through.

# Tuesday 28th.

Sleep in. More wireless messages. One day we seem to nearly have an axle, next day, noone has heard of it. Started developing films. Washing under difficulties. Other stranded couple going to Darwin to live. Husband in Darwin at present getting new parts for the car. The half-formed plans that were considered and mostly fell flat, for bringing our axle and us together..... Making damper every day, because only bread available is made from hops by native women. Kitchen without chairs. The women sit on the floor

as they prepare tomatoes etc., apparently for meals. House is low, with wide verandahs, enclosed by wire gauze. Roof over one area seems to have succumbed to white ants.

# Wednesday 29th.

dio, to find if axle had arrived. Inverway call At night, the blazing campfires, and the chattering of native voices in their own strange language dominate the otherwise peaceful scene. Finally.....the news that our axle is in Halls Creek. (100 miles away) Frank and Eddie prepare to leave,....about 5pm. They went 100 yards and the axle gave way. So they fixed it and stayed for tea and left later. At 11.30am, the other party arrived from Darwin.

# Thursday 30th.

women and the girls work in the house, some Call on Mrs. Underwood for supplies. Our companion-in-distress busy under his car. Volkswagen pulled in from Wave Hill way. "Tann" from Ringwood, Melbourne. Road not graded through Swan River section. First clouds indicating the approach of the "wet season" appeared. Road is closed from November to May to allow for the wet season.

# Friday 31st. August

Frank and Eddie arrived before 1 o'clock today. Had a fairly good trip, only one breakdown, near Flora Valley. Grader arrived, going on the road to Nicholson. Made preparations for leaving tomor-

# A PHAETON NAMED RUBY

Published in "The Plymouth Bulletin Jan-Feb 1980 The lady's name was Ruby - Ruby M. Ayres--and she was 72 years old, had just renewed her driver's licence for another three years. Her car--a 1934 Plymouth PF Phaeton with a body by Holden. Now the property of Don Main of Victoria, Australia, "Ruby" as the car is affectionately known, began life in the Detroit assembly plant in the United States. The chassis, fenders, grill, engine, hood and Instrument panel were shipped to Australia in 1934 where it was fitted with a phaeton body by Holden. Now a General Motors subsidiary, at the time Holden was an independent Australian firm in Adelaide that supplied bodies to most of the makes of cars imported into Australia.

"Ruby" was purchased new in 1934 by Sydney. Cooke (a well-known Australian manufacturer of nuts, bolts, screws and photographic equipment) but he kept the car only one year, trading it to Lanes Motors. The car was then purchased by Ruby Ayre's brother. He drove the car until 1952 when he sold it to her. Miss Ayres drove the car up to 1972 but by then she felt the car was getting to be too much for her to handle. Reluctantly she put the car up for sale and purchased a Morris 1100. Buying the car from Miss Ayres proved to be an experience and the story Is best told by Don Main himself.

"Miss Ayres had advertised the car in our club magazine but it was about three or four weeks before I decided to have a look at it. Before calling Miss Ayres to have a look I phoned her to make an appointment. After arriving at her home, she asked me to come back in a few days as she was not feeling well but if I returned in two days, she would back the car out for me. Two days later I returned and Miss Ayres did back the car out. There it sat—a little dull, a little tattered and with hand painted lacquer. I liked it!"

"After hearing the cars faults and its history and all about the other people wanting to buy the car Miss Ayres asked me 'Would I like to go for a ride?" You bet I did. With Miss Ayres as passenger alongside me we set off down her street, around a few others, then up a steep hill which required a gear change to reach the top. When I changed down without mashing the gears her face lit up with a grin and she said 'You know how to drive. Maybe this helped in the final negotiation.

"It took me six weeks of negotiation to finally buy "Ruby. "When I would call Miss Ayres, she was either not at home, helping her sister, away or any other various excuse. But I persisted and finally bought the car. Miss Ayres was not worried about the amount of money for the car but she was con-

cerned about where the car was going and whether it would be restored or hot rodded. After settling on a price, it was agreed I would pay the registration and obtain a Roadworthy Certificate (required by local law) but what clinched it, being a builder, I could see a few things needed doing around her place so I offered to build two new garage doors and two new trellis gates for her drive, which I did. But she still cried when "Ruby" was driven away." Since buying "Ruby" the car has been taken back to Miss Ayres on several occasions and she still expresses the wish that she still owned her.

"Ruby" is a 5-passenger model PF phaeton. The car remains mostly original. The interior was originally done in blue leather. The back seat remains original but the front seat was retrimmed in blue vinyl. The hood had to be replaced and the fenders required considerable bodywork and repainting. The six cylinder engine is original but has been reringed and the crankshaft was reground and new bearings were in-stalled. "Ruby" is painted a dark blue that has a slight greenish tint the fenders are black and the wheels are Packard Ivory. Originally the body sported Packard ivory pin stripes but these have to be restriped. The car is built on a standard PP chassis with coil spring suspension and 5.50x17" wire wheels.

The Holden body plate states the car has body number 25 and refers to the car as a Chrysler PP. The car was fitted with Jaken Glass hinged side windows when new at a cost of \$57.

No phaetons were built In the U.S. after 1932. "Ruby" is a fine example of a very sporty body style and it makes one wonder how many could have been sold in the U.S. had it been made available. There is at least one other '34 Plymouth Phaeton known in Australia but "Ruby" remains something very special.

Ray Griffin purchased "Ruby" from Don Main in 1993.

Since purchase from Don, my son David freed up the seized engine. I had new carpets fitted and side curtains made, changing it back to original, this also made it easier to put the roof down myself. Over the last 29 years we have continued to drive "Ruby", but not as often as the other cars we have. The longest trip was to Bendigo, to meet up with Ed Peterson at a gathering of 1934 Plymouths. Another long weekend away was to Warragul. Mostly the car is used on local car club runs on the Mornington Peninsula

Ruby is still very original, but is awaiting a new motor to be fitted (soon I hope) as the old one is using a bit of oil, but still runs ok.





# CHACA CLUB PERMIT SCHEME **ELIGIBILITY GUIDELINES**

CHACA is a VicRoads authorised Club to participate in the VicRoads Club Permit Scheme (CPS).

VicRoads has set rules to determine the eligibility of vehicles for the Club Permit Scheme. These may be viewed in the CPS handbook or on the VicRoads website. CHACA has set its own additional requirements for vehicles to be submitted for the CPS using CHACA's authorisation. The additional requirements are in line with the original CHACA charter of vehicle originality and preservation.

The following are CHACA's requirements for Members submitting vehicles for CPS assessment.

- 1. The vehicle must have been manufactured prior to 1st December 1992.
- 2. The member submitting the application must have been a CHACA member for at least 3 months.
- 3. Vehicles submitted for CPS application must be as the manufacturer originally designed and built. Some modifications are permitted in line with the original manufacture option list, are period correct, or are based on safety issues, but in all cases must not detract from originality. Replicas derived from a lower model are acceptable as long as the appearance is as original as possible to the intended vehicle model (e.g. GT Falcon from a base Falcon).
- 4. Applicants for the CPS will certify that the vehicle submitted will remain roadworthy during the permit period and unmodified from what was originally submitted.
- 5. Once a vehicle has been accepted by CHACA for CPS it will be the members' responsibility to maintain the vehicle as originally presented, with no further modifications and in a roadworthy condition for all permit renewal applications.
- Determination of the eligibility for any vehicle submitted to CHACA for CPS will be at the discre-6. tion of the Committee. Vehicle CPS application must be submitted to the Technical Officer in writing.




