

President's Piece

The year is moving along quickly and Easter approaches. The Hot Cross Bun Run is on the 7th April and CHACA is hosting it. This year we are also having our vehicle judging at this event. This is always a good day and hosting is rotated each year between the Veteran Car Club, Vintage Drivers' Club, CHACA & Austin 7 Club. More details are in this issue,

The AOMC meeting was held in early March and the guest speaker was Leigh Booth, VicPol major accident investigator (retired). The focus of his presentation was tyres which are a very important part of our vehicles - modern and historic. Leigh has investigated all types of vehicle accidents including trams. His focus was on tread separation caused by tyre age, exposure to UV light, heating/cooling cycles and other reasons. Whilst he stated that there is no hard and fast rule about tyre age, his opinion is that 7 to 8 years is optimum. This depends on the tyre walls being free of cracks. All tyres are marked with a manufacture date, which is 4 figures on the sidewall for tyres manufactured after year 2000. The first two digits refer to the week of the year it was made and the last two digits specify the year. As an example, 2109 is a tyre that was manufactured in the 21st week of 2009. A different system was used prior to 2000 but those tyres would be more than 20 years old and should not be used.

In 2023 Committee is trying to make our regular Thursday meetings more interesting to more Members. In order to do this we are having lunch time get togethers in winter months, guest speakers both from the Club and "outside" and business meetings every few months to keep Members informed. We hope that you will like what we are doing. The March meeting will be a business one with Ken Leeden as guest speaker. In April the CEO of the Puffing Billy Railway will speak to us. We will also have regular coffee mornings.

Huge return for Phillip Island Classic

THIS year's Phillip Island Classic 'Festival of Motorsport' will be an outstanding event with some of the finest historic cars from around the world competing on the world renowned Grand Prix Circuit at Phillip Island from March 10-12.

Not only are there six classic Formula One cars from Europe including the 1972 Surtees TS16/02, the Shadow DN8, the Tyrrell 012, the Ensign N179, the Lotus 81, and the Hesketh 308-1, racing some of the finest historic race cars in Australia but there are four spectacular sports cars also from Europe.

The sports cars include Leon Ebeling's 1962 Shelby Cobra 289, Steve Brooks Lola T70 Mk 3b, Ludovic Caron's Chevron B31, a historic Le Mans competitor and Andrew Newall's 1966 Chevron B6- a multiple World Championship Car in which Andrew won the 2015 FIA Masters Historic Sports Car Championship.

The Chevron B24 driven by Tom Tweedie has the distinction of being the first type of Formula 5000 car to beat the Formula 1 machines in a combined event, this occurring at Brands Hatch in 1973 after Peter Gethin had also won the regular Formula 5000 race.

With the entry of Tim Berryman in the 1979 Lola T332, in which Australian past World Champion Alan Jones finished 4th on 1979 Australian Grand Prix at Oran Park Raceway, we will see two of the fastest Formula 5000 cars in Australia competing against the international Formula One's.

Also competing will be the very rare 1962 Ferrari 196 SP Dino which was raced in the 1962 Sebring 12 Hours by the North American Racing Team.

The first of the mid/rear-engine Ferrari's, it was one of only five that were built and is the only one surviving.

The car continued to race with success in major events in Europe and USA before passing into the hands of some of the prominent collectors before recently arriving in Australia.

From the USA, the well-known and highly competitive 1959 Old Yeller Mk11 raced by Ernie Nagamatsu will once again make an appearance at the Phillip Island Circuit.

A feature race on the Sunday will see competitors in the Formula Ford category race for the Perkins Cup in honour of legendary Australian driver Larry Perkins.

Also on the Sunday, the Phillip Island Classic 'Festival of Motorsport' will feature two international events with more than forty Formula Fords on the grid with entrants from, New Zealand, Ireland, USA and UK competing against Australian drivers.



The second international race on the Sunday we will see the six international Formula One cars racing against four of Australia's Formula One cars.

Competing in regularity will be the 1946 Maybach Mk1 which won the 1954 New Zealand Grand Prix driven by Stan Jones. This car was the first successful race car developed and built in Australia to win a Grand Prix event.

On static display at the circuit will be a number of world famous feature cars including Allan Jones 1979 World Championship Williams; the March 701 driven by Italian past World Champion Mario Andretti; an Indy car driven by four times winner

of the Indianapolis 500 Rick Mears and a 1985 Ferrari 156/85. Past Bathurst winners Steven Richards and Greg Murphy will be racing in Group C & A in the Nissan HR31 turbo cars against the Ford Sierra's, one driven by Chris Stillwell.

In a move to assist competitors at a time of higher inflation, a very committed Mark Tierney, Race Fuels CEO has just announced that his company will hold the cost of fuel at last year's level for this year's Phillip Island Classic event.

Once again, the event has strong support from major motor and industry sponsors such as Penrite, Shannons, Cooldrive and Apex Steel, Dutton Garage, Bendix Brakes and Trico with support also coming from Bass Coast Shire Council and Events Gippsland who all recognise the importance of this major sporting event.

The Phillip Island Classic 'Festival of Motorsport' is a family friendly event attracting youths, families with young children right through to senior citizens because of the range of authentic race cars presented along with exciting and competitive racing.



At the February Meeting Barry and Rozz Smith kindly brought in for display their 1910 Delage 10hp Voiturette Veteran. Barry also gave a brief presentation to the meeting on the details of the vehicle.

Production of the first Delage motor cars commenced at Courbevoie-sur-Seine in 1905, the earliest light cars being powered by a single-cylinder, De Dion-type engine. Early production leant heavily towards light cars and Delage products enjoyed some considerable success in contemporary voiturette racing.

Delage were to use other proprietary engines from such manufacturers as Chapuis Dornier and Ballot before manufacturing their own engines for all their models.


The two-seater coachwork, with a full width bucket seat, buttoned black upholstery, polished aluminium body panels and extensive brass accessories is presented in dark blue guards and boot with fine pin striping. The chassis is equipped with cable brakes and semi-elliptic suspension all round.











Tasmania road trip so good my classic car didn't want to leave

After years of delays, this classic car enthusiast finally got to take the Tasmanian road trip of his dreams - but returning home wasn't so easy.

Tasmania, for me, can be summed up by two old fridges, stacked full of warm wood-fire baked bread waiting for punters to buy, sitting on a dirt road corner in the middle of Bruny Island.

Nobody is present to close sales; an honour system is at play, a slot cut into the base of one of the relic machines for the money. And if you don't have cash, account details are penned inside one of the doors – no worries. It's clever, generous, charming and unexpected all at the same time. And typical of the welcome all over the isle.



The mission was to get my old 1956 Chev, Lois, across from Melbourne for a years-delayed road-trip, poking about Tasmania for the first time as a tourist, fulfilling some wishlist stops and catching up with family and friends on their own soil. My itinerary was loose, but the shape of travel took the form of a big "T" – landing in Devonport, driving across to Launceston, side-tripping east a little and back, then down to Hobart, further on to Bruny Island, and returning up the middle and back to the boat.

There is no doubt that Tasmania does traditional, quaint and scenic to perfection – just look at the lush countryside, natural landscapes and the old buildings. But it also does progressive, creative and cultural to brilliant levels – as seen at Mona, various hipster eateries such as Pigeon Whole Bakers in Hobart, and Derby's world-class mountain-bike terrain.

My background is in design so Mona had been in my sights for many years, and a 24-hour experience there was stellar. The gallery itself was as expected – totally off the charts with its self-confidence in broad concept and detailed display. The extent of the content did not overwhelm, surprisingly, as something regular galleries and museums can overload.

Faro restaurant, however, was nothing that anyone could pre-imagine – a surreal occasion that brought subtle avant-garde music, intimate theatrical performances and digital display to the food and wine offering, including a motionless live statue guest completing a four at our table for the first hour of



dining. And to round out time there, an overnight stay in Mona's Brett Whiteley Pavilion apartment was sumptuous in every aspect – building design, furnishings, morning views, bush setting, hospitality (mega bar fridge) and, fittingly, several original artworks from the artist himself – a personal fine-art hero. A big thanks goes to my Tasmanian friends Jaime and Megan for scheming, hosting and being brilliant company throughout.

Travelling in the Chev provided a fantastic dimension to the trip. With the car's scale and typical 1950s appearance, the next unscheduled meeting and conversation was never too far away. Plenty of photo opportunities were had, and quick Q&A sessions all over the place complemented my otherwise solo travel dimension. And the actual driving of the car, with its chugging old V8 motor and soft ride suspension, made for a transplanting of sorts to another time and space.

A short drive south of Hobart was the wondrous Bruny Island, a quick ferry ride from Kettering. Lois loved the 90km an hour speed limit on winding roads and her owner loved much that the elegantly divided land mass area had to offer, including two lovely track walks to the east side – one up and around a spectacular headland and the other along a pristine beach, showing me how these natural marvels might have looked before suburbs were thought of.

In between these ventures were stops for whisky, oysters, cheese and an enormous local beef schnitzel dinner.

Fortuitously, Tasmania's native orchids were starting to flower and a few bushland walks all over provided opportunity to check them out. Being small and sparsely positioned these wonders can be difficult to spot, but the challenge to locate becomes part of their appeal.

Other highlights included the inspired Scandinavian-styled floating sauna at Lake Derby, an ethereal morning tasting bubbly at Jansz, a quick belt up Kunanyi/Mt Wellington for Hobart sunset views, a mind -altering whisky masterclass at Belgrove Distillery near Kempton, and a delicious lunch and wines flight at Launceston's Josef Chromy Wines.

When it came time to board the Spirit of Tasmania and return, Lois lost power in the middle of the boarding lanes with a dead battery. Was it an emotional breakdown as much as a mechanical one? I am starting to think so. Clearly she didn't want to leave. And seriously, could I blame her?

CHACA CLUB PERMIT SCHEME **ELIGIBILITY GUIDELINES**

CHACA is a VicRoads authorised Club to participate in the VicRoads Club Permit Scheme (CPS).

VicRoads has set rules to determine the eligibility of vehicles for the Club Permit Scheme. These may be viewed in the CPS handbook or on the VicRoads website. CHACA has set its own additional requirements for vehicles to be submitted for the CPS using CHACA's authorisation. The additional requirements are in line with the original CHACA charter of vehicle originality and preservation.

The following are CHACA's requirements for Members submitting vehicles for CPS assessment.

- 1. The vehicle must have been manufactured prior to 31st December 1992.
- 2. Vehicles submitted for CPS application must be as the manufacturer originally designed and built. Some modifications are permitted in line with the original manufacture option list, are period correct, or are based on safety issues, but in all cases must not detract from originality. Replicas derived from a lower model are acceptable as long as the appearance is as original as possible to the intended vehicle model (e.g. GT Falcon from a base Falcon).
- Applicants for the CPS will certify that the vehicle submitted will remain roadworthy during the 3. permit period and unmodified from what was originally submitted.
- 4. Once a vehicle has been accepted by CHACA for CPS it will be the members' responsibility to maintain the vehicle as originally presented, with no further modifications and in a roadworthy condition for all permit renewal applications.
- 5. Determination of the eligibility for any vehicle submitted to CHACA for CPS will be at the discretion of the Committee. Vehicle CPS application must be submitted to the Technical Officer in







