
Meals

in the station workshop. Blacksmith would not attempt to forge it. Oxy welding plant not suitable for the job. Lathe out of action. No electric welder. Frank put sleeve on axle and bolted it.

Here it was washing day. Took tub, boiler dishes, clothes, etc. over half a mile of rocks down to the waterhole and boiled and washed our clothes. Dried on line between trees. It was at all times a battle with the wind. Flocks of birds, mostly green parrots, at their evening frolics, sweeping like fantastic wraiths against the distant sky overhead then twisted and turned with a rush of wings and a flash of colour.

Frank home before dark. No dinner. Put axle in car while I washed our clothes. Ironed at night. Washed hair. Bed at 1am.

Monday 20th.

Packed up this morning, ready for the big test. We went 6 yards..... and it snapped. So we unpacked. Frank rode into Wave Hill and sent a telegram to Darwin, left another one to go to Perth if necessary. Station store man gave us meat and bread. Bull-dozer working on crossing. Grader went out 10 miles and came back, Said he will take us to Victoria River tomorrow if we want to go out. C.W.D. camp shifting tomorrow. Donald's transport went through. C.W.D. driver filled our caravan water tank.

Tuesday 21st.

Expecting grader this morning at 9.30am. We had breakfast and packed up, quite early. We had a few bad moments, just after 8 0'clock when we heard the grader coming. But it turned out that he was shifting their own trailer and caravan. While waiting for him to come we watched the display of thousands of green parrots. The sky was dark with them, as they spread out overhead or swept in undulating waves on the horizon.

Presently the grader arrived, graded a road into the car, then towed us at less than 5mph. We climbed gradually to the top of a grassy treeless hill, had a wonderful view of the countryside, then started to descend. Soon we were following a road that wound between mountains and crossed a wide sandy creek. There were a few rough rocky patches. Then we saw the C.W.D. camp at the side of the road, and immediately began the descent into the Victoria River. There was a deep pool upstream, but the crossing was dry and consisted of flat stones. The climb up was very steep, and the soil was very loose and sandy. We were parked

under a tree, almost a quarter mile from the bank. 5 miles from where we broke the axle.

Settled in, had dinner (*lunch*), then Frank visited the Policeman. Later on we walked on the river bank, Eddie and Allan looking at the possibility of fishing. Policeman came looking for us. Had word from Darwin that no axle was available. Also one could not get here from Perth till next week. Later Frank discussed other possibilities with policeman, but there seems to be no other alternative. After that we followed the creek down to the river to look for our fishermen, but they, failing to find any bait, had gone home. As we walked back we met the C.W.D. truck and 3drivers. They promised to fill our water-tank tomorrow.

Wednesday 22nd.

A new school for dark children is being built near the Police Station, also kitchen quarters and School-master's residence. The house is on tall



thin blocks, 4 inch cement pipes, I believe. Looks top heavy. Policeman's house is older style, high blocks, living area at ground level, floor of concrete slabs, cool breezeways, rooms completely enclosed by fly gauze. One or two solid walls, evidently to shut out cold winds. Top portion of house...instead of having solid walls, has a louvered type of wall from floor to ceiling.

C.W.D. truck arrived with water. We filled tank, water-bags, buckets, etc.. Promised Frank a lift into station in afternoon. We prepared to have breakfast after he left, but he was back almost immediately, said he was going to town then. So while he went off to attend to something, Frank had a hasty breakfast, took axle out of car, with Eddie and Allan helping, changed, and was ready to go with him.

We sat down for breakfast then and were almost finishing when a blue Customline and caravan appeared over the crest of the hill and pulled in towards us. We had been told of this turn-out some days ago. Suddenly found we knew them, from Rockhampton, Mackay, and Atherton. Smyd is their name. They left Bundaberg last March and went south, then came up the West Coast. Had a lot of fun on this road from Nicholsen to here, where they met the grader and he fixed up a creek crossing while they waited. Before that, they used to fix up their own creek crossings. Had morning tea with us, then went on to Victoria River Station where they met Frank.

Washed car and caravan. Eddie and Allan trying to catch fish for bait to catch more fish. Frank came back with Policeman and his wife. Stronger repair to axle this time. A slot in each end of the axle with a tongue inserted, all held together with a pipe riveted over the joint.

Pack up, replace axle, collect our fishermen, minus fish, and prepare to leave. Visit Policeman, receive meat, send telegram to Kilkivan (Dad's parents), then we left. The C.W.D. camp was shifted 30 miles out earlier this afternoon. Road quite good, but one patch of loose sand was very heavy and soon after that, as we climbed out of a creek, we heard the axle go, and quickly pulled off the road under trees on the bank of a deep waterhole...It's a fairly good spot, so here we are for the night, with the wild donkeys braying in the hills on the other side of the creek. They make a weird, awful noise in the night. I'm glad we were warned.....that sound without forewarning would make one's hair stand on end.

Baked damper. Wave Hill is the second largest cattle station in the world, covering $6\frac{1}{2}$ thousand square miles . Running 50,000 head of cattle at present, but it's only half stocked. The largest, Victoria River Downs, runs untold thousands.

Thursday 23rd.

Eddie and Allan were up at daybreak this morning to do some fishing. Later decided there were no fish there anyway. We had breakfast, finished fixing axle and packed up, ready to leave. One car passed, a green utility, a stranger

to us. Then a C.W.D. truck with a caravan in tow. He stopped and spoke for a few moments. We followed a short distance behind him. Half the road had been graded. We passed a couple of large waterholes. Caught up to the truck when he stopped at a gate and found the large fridge in one caravan had tipped over. Followed him another couple of miles to where they were making their new camp, 13 miles from the Police Station, on the bank of a large waterhole. We went on there, across open rolling country, few trees but plenty of grass, rich, good looking country where one has a sweeping view for miles on every side. Red hills in the distance. Very rough road. Then, 20 miles from where we started, a sharp gully, and the axle went. So prepared dinner while it was being fixed. Passed time of day with a driver from Inverway, and H. Carter from Orange driving a Holden Ute. Heard a grader somewhere ahead of us. Had dinner, and when we were ready to leave, a big truck was going through our way so he towed us up the hill. At the same time the grader arrived. Truck was going through to Limbunya and had a load of 44 gallon drums etc. and 2 black women and 3 children aboard...

The grader driver warned us of a bad creek crossing, so we followed the truck whose driver knew a better crossing. It was very rough and the car literally bounced, but we got through safely. Eddie walked to lighten the load. More rough road, rocky patches, and really good stretches in places. At a deep creek crossing we walked and Spotty (dog) thought it an injustice to treat a dog like that. Passed a large waterhole in a gap between the hills, which was the limit of the grader's operations. Road fair, but we suddenly found the axle had gone again and pulled in for repairs. (11 miles).

We saw creek crossings which the Smyds had filled in. Then there was the rough crossing where we saw 6 inches of daylight under the front wheels as they bounced. The caravan brake lever caught and was broken there..It often catches and so does the back bumper bar of the car.

Axle fixed again, we continued on our way. Came to a place where what had once been the road gradually washed out until it became a gully. The present road went along the bank of it then crossed. There we again did the axle. (2 miles). So, prepared tea while it was being mended. Just had it together again when a Holden came along, 2 men in it. They helped us push the car and caravan to a flat spot on top of the slope. Stopped and talked and eventually had tea with us. They came from Darwin. One was going to Perth to get a new car. After travelling these roads he will probably need one!

Friday 24th.

4 miles..puncture, 9 miles..axle, 6 miles..axle, 3 miles to stop.

Didn't feel much like getting up this morning, but we were ready to leave by 10am. We seem to be in pleasant forest country now. There was a hill and lots of rocks near our o'night stop. Dark red anthills. Red soil, sandy. Spotty is beginning to take on the same colour. Within a half mile we found out why we had heard the Holden so long after it had left us last night.. Sharp little gullies where we all got out and walked, sometimes pushed. Spot doesn't believe in walking. Then a windmill, no water, but a discarded winch and a length of 5/16' chain. A long incredible nightmare of a road. Rocks sticking up 6 inches or more. The tyres ran, bounced and climbed over them.

It lasted for about a mile and then, miraculously, we were through. All in one piece and onto a good dirt road. Rather loose and heavy in places. Then we had a puncture. Tyre had a big cut in it. A new one, we went for 9 miles on a quite good road, when suddenly the wheel scraped alarmingly on the mudguard and we stopped to find the axle had parted company and the wheel was coming off. Had dinner then and spent a while at repairs. New sleeve on axle, parts of chain link instead of bolts and started cutting up a tyre lever for the tongue...

Truck driver, Quirk, who towed us yesterday, came along with load of empty 44 gallon drums. He was going back to Katherine. Told

us of old Chev, same model as this, in rubbish dump near Wave Hill. May be axles there. Sounds drastic, to say we are stranded in the desert with a broken axle, but he said this is the desert.

Certainly there's a lot of spinifex, stunted trees, and some type of low scrubby bushes. The road is limestone, the surrounding country red sandy soil. But there are patches of wildflowers in delicate lavender shades, with a heavy sweet scent. Not a strong perfume, though.

Wheel on again, we started off once more. A winding road, fairly heavy going in loose sandy soil, washouts that made one wheel track 12 inches lower than the other. Sudden little deep gutters across the road. Then a mile or so of unbelievably rough rocky road. Then onto red sand again, and suddenly there was a grating and grinding as the wheel came half off. We rolled to a stop and once more began repair work. The job done swiftly, we again went on. It was getting late and we were looking for a rock-hole with good water, to stop for the night.

We soon found it, saw a car on the far side, two men travelling east. They gave a helping push as Frank raced the car through loose sand and up the far side to park for the night. They camped down in the creek. It's getting cold.

Saturday 25th.

<u>6 yds..axle, 5 miles..axle, 2 miles..axle, 2</u> miles..night stop.

This morning the sky was overcast. The wind boisterous, and whistling round the caravan. The moon, which has just passed the full, was blotted out. By daylight the wind still blew fiercely,, it always does here, anyway, but the sun shone warmly later. The two men in the Vauxhall left before 9am., our time, and we were ready soon after. Filled watertank from rockpool... pool set in ironstone and formed by waterfall in creek bed., about 5 feet deep.

CHACA CLUB PERMIT SCHEME **ELIGIBILITY GUIDELINES**

CHACA is a VicRoads authorised Club to participate in the VicRoads Club Permit Scheme (CPS).

VicRoads has set rules to determine the eligibility of vehicles for the Club Permit Scheme. These may be viewed in the CPS handbook or on the VicRoads website. CHACA has set its own additional requirements for vehicles to be submitted for the CPS using CHACA's authorisation. The additional requirements are in line with the original CHACA charter of vehicle originality and preservation.

The following are CHACA's requirements for Members submitting vehicles for CPS assessment.

- 1. The vehicle must have been manufactured prior to 1st December 1992.
- 2. The member submitting the application must have been a CHACA member for at least 3 months.
- 3. Vehicles submitted for CPS application must be as the manufacturer originally designed and built. Some modifications are permitted in line with the original manufacture option list, are period correct, or are based on safety issues, but in all cases must not detract from originality. Replicas derived from a lower model are acceptable as long as the appearance is as original as possible to the intended vehicle model (e.g. GT Falcon from a base Falcon).
- 4. Applicants for the CPS will certify that the vehicle submitted will remain roadworthy during the permit period and unmodified from what was originally submitted.
- Once a vehicle has been accepted by CHACA for CPS it will be the members' responsibility to 5. maintain the vehicle as originally presented, with no further modifications and in a roadworthy condition for all permit renewal applications.
- Determination of the eligibility for any vehicle submitted to CHACA for CPS will be at the discre-6. tion of the Committee. Vehicle CPS application must be submitted to the Technical Officer in writing.






